# Buckden Parish Council News...

#### **Climate Change Mitigation Workshop**

We are running a workshop on 11<sup>th</sup> January titled 'What on Earth Can Buckden Do'. Please join us between 1 and 7pm in the village hall. We have a wide range of speakers and stall holders. #### Buckden Neighbourhood Plan

The Plan is still available for you to view as part of a formal consultation process. This will conclude on 10<sup>th</sup> January. You can view the plan and provide feedback by going to the BPC web site, (see below). Paper copies are also available in the village hall office.

This is an important document. It sets out what developers can and can't do in our village. Whilst we cannot stop the Silver Street development, which is included in the Huntingdonshire Local Plan, we have drafted policies, particularly about traffic, house type and design which the developers must comply with. When finalised it will also significantly increase the amount of money the village receives from developers. It is important we get your feedback. Once the consultation is complete the plan will be submitted for review by a planning inspector.

#### **Financial Update**

You will be aware that County and District Council budgets are under ever increasing pressure. This in turn places pressure on the Parish Council budget. We are making every effort to mitigate this by seeking grants to fund developments in the village. Examples of these are:

- Round-about-Buckden walk & new public right of way (Cambridgeshire Community Foundation A14 fund) £5510
- Local Cycling & Walking Plan preparation and publication. (Cambridgeshire Community Foundation A14 fund) £9000
- Zebra Crossing Hunts End by Primary School (Cambs CC 2018 Local Highways initiative) £9,104 matched by £9,104 from BPC.
- Perry Road speed control measures, to be completed. (Cambs CC 2018 Local Highways initiative) £7,300 matched by £5,300 from BPC

- Neighbourhood Plan (Groundwork UK) £9000
- Allotments Notice Board and refurbishments (NISA and Annie Furbank) £1090.



We are currently seeking funding for traffic calming measures in Mill Road.

#### Lucks Lane

Considerable damage has been done to the Lucks Lane/ Springfield Close junction as part of the sewer works. This has been reported to Bloor Homes.

#### Silver Street and Mill Road developments

Both developments remain on hold. We are meeting with Highways England in early January to receive an update on progress in relation to the Roundabout.

#### Mill Road

We expect to hear from Cambridgeshire County Council about progress with traffic calming measures on this dangerous stretch of road in February. We will keep you updated.

If you receive a letter from your bank or Building Society and it causes you concern, either take the letter to the bank or building society in person and speak to a bank employee or you can check the details by telephone but use the telephone number on the original bank documents when you opened your account.

Always check and check again with the telephone number, do not use the number on the letter that has been sent to you.

Ensure that all letters sent to you on financial matters are either shredded or properly filed away.

Fraudsters search through bins, mainly blue bins, for names and addresses and other details that they can use.

#### **ON-LINE**

- A message to say that your internet security has been compromised.
- A warning that your TV licence needs renewing immediately.
- A message to say that there is a virus in your computer software.
- The usual message is that something has gone wrong and there is a small amount to pay.
- They need your bank details,
- They may even ask you to log on and follow their instructions, thus giving them access to your laptop or computer.


# Rationing |11

#### Rationing – 80 years on

The Second World War officially started after Nazi Germany invaded Poland on September 1, 1939. In January 1940, the British government introduced food rationing. 80 years on, we take a look at this unusual challenge which faced British households for more than a decade.

Buckden resident, Ella Pentelow, who lived in Huntingdonshire at the time filled us in with her experience. She lived at Home Farm, Buckworth as a child and later at Catworth School House and went to Huntingdon Grammar School. We are also grateful to Ella for lending us the ration books in the photos.


Before the Second World War started Britain imported about 55 million tons of food a year from other countries. After war was declared the British government had to cut down on the amount of food it brought in from abroad as German submarines started attacking British supply ships. There was a worry that this would lead



to shortages of A food ration book from near the beginning of rationing ('40)

food supplies in the shops so the British government decided to introduce a system of rationing.

Ella says she just about remembers the start of food rationing but better remembers its ending when she was at college in London. She recalls bombs being dropped on the edge of Buck-

worth by returning British planes that had to release their undropped bombs before they could land. The windows of the school house shattered – Ella's mother was horrified when Ella was running around in the broken glass without her slippers. Ella didn't particularly notice a difference when rationing was introduced, perhaps because they lived on a farm produc-



national shortage. It made sure that people got an equal amount of food every week. The government was worried that as food became scarcer, prices would rise and poorer people might not be able to afford to eat. There was also a danger that some people might hoard food, leaving none for others.

Fuel ration coupons for domestic and agricultural vehicles The Ministry of Food was responsible for

overseeing rationing. Every man, woman and child was given a ration book with coupons. These were required before rationed goods could be purchased. Ella remembers that people had to redeem coupons at specified shops and that ration books came from the Food Office run by the District Office in Huntingdon.

Basic foodstuffs such as sugar, meat, fats, bacon and cheese were directly rationed by an allowance of coupons. There were no supermarkets, so people had to visit several different shops to buy meat, vegetables, bread and other goods. When people wanted to buy some food, the items they bought were crossed off in their ration book by the shopkeeper.

Ella tells us people had to carry their sugar ration in a tin in London – Ella gave up sugar at this time as she always forgot her tin.

A number of other items, such as tinned goods, dried fruit, cereals and biscuits, were rationed using a points system. The number of points allocated changed according to availability and consumer demand.

Priority allowances of milk and eggs were given to those most in need, including children and expectant mothers.

As shortages increased, long queues became commonplace. People could reach the front of a long queue, only to find out that the item they had been waiting for had just run out.

Growing up on a farm, Ella saw rationing from the farmer's point of view as well as the consumer's. A central office collected food from the farm. Once, when the eggs were collected from the farm while no one was at home, they collected a 'pot egg' and paid for it. This was a fake egg, used to encourage hens to lay and nobody would be able to eat it.

As the war went on, Ella tells us more and more land was incorporated into food production but it didn't affect the family farm. They grew wheat and barley, kept cattle (for meat and dairy) and hens.

Rationing was designed to ensure fair shares for all at a time of

They delivered milk to Hamerton in 1/4 and 1/3 pint bottles with a cardboard lid. Ella remembers dropping the bottle intended for a couple of elderly ladies and worrying that they would not be able to have their cup of tea, but luckily her father was able to replace the bottle. Full milk churns were collected from the side of the road at the farm and empty churns left for the next milking.

Not all foods were rationed. Fruit and vegetables were never rationed but were often in short supply, especially tomatoes, onions and fruit shipped from overseas. The government encouraged people to grow vegetables in their own gardens and allotments. Many public parks were also used for this purpose. The scheme became known as 'Dig For Victory'. Ella also let us know how friends used to supplement and share produce with each other – fruit from trees, veg from their gardens, etc.

Ella recalls there were no oranges or bananas during the war (the only exotic fruits that Ella remembered from before the war). She remembers seeing bananas hanging in a greengrocer's shop in Huntingdon, but being disappointed when she discovered they were cardboard ones to advertise Fyffes.

The Ministry of Food gave out recipes to help with rationing. Ella remembers one in particular which was to make 'bananas'

using parsnip. She found it revolting!

One way to get rationed items without coupons, usually at greatly inflated prices, was on the black market. Shopkeepers sometimes kept special supplies 'behind the counter', and 'spivs' - petty criminals - traded in goods often obtained by dubious means. By March 1941, 2,300 people had been prosecuted and severely penalised for fraud and dishonesty.

As the war went on, additional key commodities were rationed. Clothing was rationed from 1941. Ella reflected on clothing shortages and told us she would spend a long time trying to buy shoes that were smart for school but which also looked special enough for going out. Her mother bought clothing coupons from people who didn't want them, which was probably illegal 'black market' behaviour!

Ella told us that people had to pass their coupon book to the shopkeeper for them to cut out the coupons. Loose coupons were not accepted. However, if buying by mail order (although this was unusual), you would send loose coupons by registered post.

People were encouraged to 'Make do and Mend' – sheets were re-sewn after being cut in half and switched so that the thinner part from the middle was at the sides. Old clothing was adapted so that it was still useful, too. Ella also remembers knitting wool was rationed and it was difficult to get the colours you wanted. Old knitwear was unpicked and knitted into something else.

The end of the war in 1945 saw additional cuts. Bread, which was never rationed during wartime, was put on the ration in July 1946. It was not until the early 1950s that most commodities came 'off the ration'. Meat was the last item to be derationed and food rationing ended completely in 1954.

Ella told us that despite what we might think, they didn't really miss any foods during the war – it was just how it was. People got on with life and it was all part of the war effort.

#### Woolton pie

Woolton pie was a variable dish of vegetables, created at the Savoy Hotel in London by its then Maitre Chef de Cuisine, Francis Latry. It was one of a number of recipes commended to the British public by the Ministry of Food during the Second World War to enable a nutritional diet to be maintained despite shortages and rationing of many types of food, especially meat.

It was named after Frederick Marquis, 1st Lord Woolton (1883 –1964), who became Minister of Food in 1940.

The recipe involved dicing and cooking potatoes (or parsnips), cauliflower, swede, carrots and, possibly, turnip. Rolled oats and chopped spring onions were added to the thickened vegetable water which was poured over the vegetables themselves. The dish was topped with potato pastry and grated cheese and served with vegetable gravy. The recipe could be adapted to reflect the availability and seasonality of ingredients.

The recipe was not well received at the time and was quickly forgotten after the end of the war. However, with the resurgence of interest in wholesome home-cooked food, maybe you'd like to try it?

Ingredients:

- 1lb diced potatoes
- 1lb cauliflower
- 1lb diced carrots
- 1lb diced swede
- 3 spring onions
- 1 teaspoon vegetable extract
- 1 tablespoon oatmeal A little chopped parsley

Method: Cook everything together with just enough water

to cover, stirring often to pre-

vent it sticking to the pan. Let

the mixture cool. Spoon into a pie dish, sprinkle with chopped parsley.

Cover with a crust of potatoes or wholemeal pastry. Bake in a moderate oven until golden brown. Serve hot with gravy.

Plough Monday



Plough Monday is a traditional English holiday marking the start of the new agricultural year and the end of Christmas. The first Monday after twelfth night – this year it will be 13 January – is celebrated all over England but particularly in the villages of East Anglia.

Plough Monday celebrations date back to the 15<sup>th</sup> century and vary village by village. Common recurrences include day long celebrations by farm labourers who would collect money, dance and drink!

In many villages, men would decorate a plough and push it door to door asking for money. In some villages, they would threaten to plough up the person's door step or garden unless they contributed but it was a light hearted celebration in general and was accompanied by music and fun. Participants would blacken their faces with soot, intended as a disguise for mischief-makers. A man or boy was often dressed up as a woman and referred to as a Molly, Betty or Bessy. A man might also be designated to play the fool, dressed in animal skins and ribbons. In Whittlesey, a man or boy was dressed as a 'straw bear'.

Dancing was a common staple, often by Morris dancers. Molly dancing is a variant of Morris dancing, involving at least one man dressed as a woman. A play involving themes of death and resurrection was often performed as well.

It was also common for church ceremonies involving blessing the plough to take place either on Plough Monday or the Sunday immediately before.

Buckden Local History Society let us know that they couldn't find records of Plough Monday being recognised in Buckden although, they say, it was no doubt celebrated here. They said, "Sometimes, it is recalled in our parish church services remembering when a plough share would be brought into church on Plough Sunday to be blessed for a plentiful harvest." 


The response has been terrific and we now have an impressive list of contributors.

# John Leslie Green VC

John Leslie Green was a recipient of the Victoria Cross, the highest award available to the armed forces for gallantry in action with the enemy.

Known as Leslie to his family, he was born in Buckden on 4 December 1888 to John George and Florence May Green and was one of three siblings. His father was a landowner and Justice of the Peace. The Green family give their name to Greenway in the village.



Green attended Felsted School, Essex, and went on to study at Downing College, Cambridge, where he gained an honours degree in natural sciences and was a good sportsman, including being a keen rower. Pursuing a career as a doctor, he studied medicine at St. Bartholomew's Hospital in London. After qualifying in 1913, he became house surgeon at Huntingdon County Hospital.

Shortly after the outbreak of the First World War in August 1914, 25 year old Green was commissioned into the Royal Army Medical Corps. The early part of his military career was spent attached to the South Staffordshire Regiment as a medical officer before being transferred to the Field Ambulance. He was later posted to the Sherwood Foresters with whom he went to France.

On New Year's Day 1916, he married Edith Moss, a fellow doctor.

On the opening day of the Battle of the Somme, 1 July 1916, the task of Green's division was to capture Gommecourt Wood. They moved off in three waves: the advancing troops faced a heavy machine-gun fire from the wood and heavy smoke. Green, who was by now a captain, advanced at the rear of the battalion. On reaching the German wire, he found an officer, Captain Frank Robinson, lying badly wounded and entangled in the wire.

Despite being under heavy fire, Green, who already had a wound himself, went forward to reach Robinson. Green dragged the injured officer to a shell-hole where he dressed his wounds, despite coming under further fire from bombs and grenades. Next, Green carried Robinson back to the British positions but, just as he was about to reach safety, Green was shot again and fatally wounded.

On 3 July, just two days after the incident, Robinson also died from his wounds. By the time the Sherwood Foresters were relieved at 18.10 hours on 2 July, the battalion had suffered 491 casualties – dead and wounded – out of the 734 men that it had started with.

Leslie Green's posthumous VC 'for most conspicuous devotion to duty' was announced on 5 August 1916. His decoration was presented to his widow, who worked at Nottingham Hospital, by King George V at an investiture in Buckingham Palace on 7 October 1916.

Green's widow later remarried and presented her first husband's medals to the Royal Army Medical Corps in Aldershot, Hampshire. Today they are on display at the Army Medical Services Museum in Mytchett, Surrey.
