#### The Neighbourhood Plan and Planning Applications

The Neighbourhood Plan is nearing completion and we will shortly begin a formal consultation process with residents. We propose to hold a series of workshops which will enable you to provide feedback about the plan. The first of these will take place in the Village Hall on 3<sup>rd</sup> September. Please join us at any time between 3 and 8 pm. We will also cover the current situation regarding the various planning applications and the roundabout proposals

#### **Barbecue**

The Allotments group held their summer barbecue in July. Despite the weather it was a great success. It was a chance for allotment holders, villagers and Parish Councillors to get together on the community area to sample great food and try some local brews. #### **Construction Traffic in the Village**

Thank you to everyone who has notified us of Lucks Lane construction traffic travelling through the village. The vehicles are only allowed to enter and exit the site via Stirtloe Lane. We have been in touch with both Mick George and Bloor Homes to make them aware of the situation. Please continue to let us know of any incidents. Photos are a big help.

#### **Lucks Lane Development**

By the time you read this the closure of Lucks Lane should have started. Please let us know if there are any significant issues.

#### Stirtloe Lane

The Parish Council, the Protect Buckdens Future Group and our District Councillor all made representations to Huntingdonshire Planning Department to introduce acceleration/



deceleration lanes at this junction. Unfortunately, they had no power to overturn the decision reached by Highways England that this junction is safe!

#### The A1 and The Roundabout

We have had a lot of feedback about the proposals outlined in last month's edition. Thank you. All of these are being analysed by the planning team. In several cases your comments have been forwarded to the Church Commissioners. We were unaware that we had traffic engineering expertise in the village. This has helped us to ask some additional questions of Highways England.

#### A New Learning Group for Buckden

A new group is being formed for the village to fulfil the role that has, up to now, been satisfied by the local WEA branch. As a result of the creation of the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority and the consequent changes to the way in which educational grants are allocated, the WEA has had to review its operating model. Unfortunately, their new model makes it difficult for most local branches to continue without significantly increasing the cost of their offering.

At a meeting on 23<sup>rd</sup> July at Buckden Towers a decision was made to make the local WEA branch 'dormant' for the immediate future. Meeting attendees were, however, adamant that they would like courses and other events to continue in the accustomed manner.

As a consequence, a new group is being formed that is to be called the Buckden Learning Group (BLG). A committee of familiar faces has been formed and using an existing network of contacts two courses have been scheduled for Tuesday mornings in the normal manner with tutors that are well known to regular course attendees.

Liz Carter will return in September with the subject of 'Victorian Crime & Punishment'. In January Marina Burrell will return with the subject of 'Famous Russian Women in World History & Culture'. (See page 19 for details)

Look out for the normal adverts and village posters for full details of these and other future events.

#### FROM YOUR DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Over the past month we have had every sort of weather; sun, hail, and last week very strong winds, which nearly blew over a brick wall on the pathway near NISA. It took a bit of time to organize a response and during that time two nearby residents stood guard at either end of the alley to make sure children did not bike through. Credit where credit is due and those that helped did a super job. The 101 service were very helpful as well and diverted the police to assist.

It's at times like these that we realize just how lucky we are. Boris Johnson has promised us 20,000 more police, but it takes up to two years to train a policeman including probationary time. This then drives home the noted significance of Cambridgeshire's Police commissioner, Jason Ablewhite, for recruiting 200 new officers 2 years earlier, the majority of whom are either during their training or have completed it. This will make a welcome difference both in Cambridgeshire and Buckden but sadly there will still be gaps; cattle on the road, local traffic gridlocks, road rage and other pertinent issues may not receive the attention we believe they deserve.

Some communities in Fenland are starting to use security contractors and Peterborough held a trial of community policing partly funded by revenue sharing from fines issues by the contractor. This is not a model I agree with given the way traffic violations are handed out in our big cities to boost revenue.

That said, we need to start thinking about what Buckden wants and needs in the future. Will we follow the route of more cameras and face recognition systems? Maybe sharing an additional PCSO and extending supervision to Brampton or Perry. The coming launch of the Neighborhood Plan by Buckden Parish council provides an opportunity to comment and think about this kind of issue. There are many possible options, but when the question "What do you want" is asked, we need to be able to give a consensus view. Given the current political situation, the question may get asked sooner than we think.

#### FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

It was interesting to see the article in the August magazine, page 7, about why traffic lights at the Buckden roundabout would probably not work, given the size of the vehicles that use it and the configuration of the roundabout.

I have been mulling over an idea for some time and have been hoping to present it for wider discussion at the A1 Safety Advisory Group which, alas, has not been convened for some time. The main problem is that vehicles wishing to get out of the High Street cannot easily do so because of the flow of heavy vehicles coming south down the A1. It is difficult and potentially dangerous because, not only is the traffic flow very heavy, the angle of the road layout makes it difficult for the Buckden High Street driver to see what is coming.

My tentative idea is that we basically need to find a way of interrupting the A1 south flow temporarily to allow local traffic to emerge safely. I wonder therefore if a part-time traffic light could be located, on the southbound A1 only, about 40 yards from the roundabout and turn red, say, every 3 minutes for about 30 seconds. This would create a gap for local vehicles to emerge safely. This expedient might only be necessary at the rush hours peaks, say, between 8 and 10 in the morning and 4 and 6 in the evening.

The above indicative figures of '3 minutes' and '30 seconds' are pure guesswork on my part and would need to be modified in the light of experience.

I have no idea if Highways regulations allow this but if they do, it might be worth trying. It would certainly be a lot less expensive than installing lights all round the roundabout. Movable traffic lights now exist which can be individually programmed, as I know from personal experience in Brampton over the last few months.

The prospect of re-routing the A1 entirely, a pipe-dream for as long as I can remember, seems to be less and less likely as national austerity persists and as the current Prime Minister is keen to improve funding for schools, increase the number of police officers, build more prisons, protect social care for the elderly **and** reduce tax for the wealthiest members of society, the possibility of a massive re-building programme for Buckden seems small.

On a different aspect of getting around – cycling. Buckden residents who cycle to Huntingdon via Brampton will be pleased to know that we seem to be making some progress in improving the cycle track. The parish councils of Brampton and Buckden hope to find a way of working together to make this happen and it is a project that might come into reality rather quicker than re-routing the A1!!

#### Traffic lights on the roundabout?

In support of the Parish Council's endeavours and initiatives on behalf of local residents, my belief is that the steady natural growth of Buckden has been such that it allows it to be still referred to as a community village.

The Church Commissioners, by the very nature of the Church's general ethos and message, ought to be seen to demonstrate a real responsibility to the local community, over and above any financial greed resulting in land sales to allow unnatural and aggressive housing development.



Recently, we have seen a real increase in traffic congestion at both the Offord level crossing, resulting in queuing along Station Lane,

into both directions of the Offord High Street, along the frontage of the container industrial park, over all three bridges and up Mill Road, across and way past the entrance to Buckden Marina

In the other direction, there is real cause for concern for the worsening congestion onto the Buckden roundabout, for residents entering onto the A1. As a direct result of the backing

up of vehicles along Buckden High Street, drivers now resort to travelling up the alternative direction of the High Street and entering the A1 north of the village, by turning left to then negotiate the Buckden roundabout to travel either A1 North, Perry Road West, or A1 South, thereafter.

Whatever the attempt of a remedy to placate and ease the present and worsening congestion situation, it would appear that it will be made on the basis of financial gain at the lowest cost, rather than the ethos of care and consideration for the residents of Buckden village.

Putting care and consideration to one side, what on earth has convinced the Church Commissioners that traffic lights on Buckden roundabout will assist in and resolve the situation?

Assuming that they have considered the increase in traffic and additional inconvenience to the current congestion following the arrival of some 300 plus vehicles with their building going ahead in Silver Street, have they factored in the additional congestion that is sure to follow the building of additional homes in Lucks Lane, which is yet to be experienced!

Please, please Church Commissioners, accept the responsibility of pastoral care over and above financial greed and make a positive contribution to the residents of Buckden, in order to keep our village, just what it is, a lovely community village and not a rural car park.





#### **Celebrating 40 years of the Roundabout**

As we celebrate the Roundabout magazine's 40th birthday this month, we look back at its history.

We chatted to the Roundabout's first editor, Brenda Steadman, to find out about the early years of the magazine. Producing a community magazine is no small task, so that fact that Brenda edited the Buckden Roundabout for 30 years, from its inception until September 2009 is an impressive achievement!

The Roundabout was set up in September 1979 by Canon Stanley Griffiths of St Mary's Church when he became vicar in Buckden. It was a joint venture between the four churches (which at that time included the Baptist Church on the Great North Road) and the Parish


Council.

In 1979 Brenda Steadman was the local correspondent for the Hunts Post and was encouraged to become editor of the new magazine. The first issue included a message from the Chairman of the Parish Council. Village clubs and organisations were invited to submit copy which would be printed for a donation. The churches also contributed to the finances at that time.

From the outset, the Roundabout was very much a community affair. Of course, production was much more difficult than it is now in the days of Microsoft Publisher! The magazine was typed - accurately - every month onto stencils and printed on a portable Roneo duplicating machine which was a gift to the newly established team. At first, printing of the necessary 800 copies took place

in people's homes. Pages were then collated by a large team of people in the Refectory at the Towers - this took almost a whole day! Covers for a whole year were printed commercially in advance and the pages were hand-stapled


Distribution was another problem to be solved. Leaflets were sent out inviting people to volunteer to deliver to houses. Brenda, together with Gwen Gibson, distributed copies each

month to the many deliverers around the village, with Brenda sitting in the back of the car, counting out however many copies were needed for the next drop.

When the time came, Brenda was sad to give it up, but

pleased to pass on the huge responsibility. When she stood down, the post was filled for a short time by Pam Davenport. At that time, Tony Gilchrist had been collating regular village events and he moved into the post of Editor in June

2011, later adding the growing Advertising Manager role to his workload. By this time, production had moved on a little. Internal pages were now printed by Margaret and David Moorhouse on a small printing machine housed in the village hall, although the covers were still printed commercially. Magazines were then collated and stapled in the Millard Room by a team of volunteers, before being passed to another team of volunteers for distribution. From February 2012,

the magazines were printed and collated by an external printer and delivered to the Village Hall ready for distribution. This certainly simplified matters, but many people probably mourned the loss of the social event that was 'collating day'. When Tony announced that he planned to step down at the end of 2013, the current team offered to take over as we felt that it would be easier to share the workload and responsibility among a group of people.

The current editorial team has worked hard to keep the magazine evolving and lively. We are particularly proud of the front covers which are now full page photos and very eye-catching - we always invite villagers to submit photos, paintings or drawings. Over the years we have gradually tweaked the layout to smarten up the look and make the best use of space. In October 2013, we launched our Roundabout website (www.buckdenroundabout.info) where every issue from that time can be accessed worldwide. We also use this as a space to publish articles too large to be included in the magazine and to publish information on village clubs, so it's worth a look.

In 2016 we decided to enter the Cambridge Building Society Community Magazine awards for the first time. That year and again in 2017 we were rewarded with a Bronze Award in the High Frequency category (magazines published 10-12 times per year). This year we were delighted to win the award for Most Improved magazine.

We hope that all our readers will continue to enjoy the magazine for years to come.





The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau has received intelligence to suggest that fraudsters are contacting social media influencers based in the UK and abroad, offering them the opportunity to market a bogus product service or investment opportunity.

Fraudsters will present professional and credible pitches to the social media influencers and try to convince them to feature the opportunity for a fee on their social media profiles in order to entice unsuspecting followers of the influencer to sign up or make a purchase. Fraudsters are using the names of well-known public figures, implying that their opportunity or product is endorsed by the figure when it is not.

The public should be aware that any apparent endorsement by celebrities, influencers or personalities does not necessarily mean that investment product or service is genuine. The public is urged to exercise a cautious approach to any such offer of investment, product or service with the same caution they would at any other time.

#### WHAT YOU NEED TO DO

If you are purchasing goods from a company you don't know and trust, carry out some research first, or ask friends or family for advice before completing a purchase.

Professional looking websites, adverts or social media posts do not guarantee that an investment opportunity or product is genuine. Criminals can exploit the names of well known brands or individuals to make them appear legitimate.

Avoid paying for goods or services by bank transfer unless you know and trust the person or company. Payments via bank transfer offer you no protection if you become a victim of fraud instead use your credit card or payment services such as Pay Pal as they offer you greater protection if you become a victim of fraud.

# BUCKDEN TOWERS A WALK AROUND THE GROUNDS

The Kings Tower is one of the most familiar landmarks in Buckden and most of us will have visited The Towers at some time, for the annual Plant Sale or one of the other events held there. But how many of us are familiar with the raised walk round the grounds?

Entering by the main gate, the car park is on the left. This used to be an enclosed barn yard at the time when the Palace of the Bishops of Lincoln was a busy place with a permanent population to be fed and looked after. To the north was the Little Park. This is now the field where sheep are grazed. In previous centuries it was probably used for the same purpose or for keeping deer.

Looking down the field to the left of St Stephen's Hall there is a magnificent oak tree in the distance. There is uncertainty about how old it is. One source states it was planted in 1603. It has been measured by experts, who found that at a height of five feet above the ground it has a girth of nineteen feet nine inches and a maximum branch spread of one hundred and twenty one feet. This would mean it is about 800 years old.

To start the walk, go to the north west corner of the car park and you will see a pathway through the trees and bushes. This path, originally about one mile in length, but now considerably shorter, was laid by Bishop John Williams some time after 1620. He planted yew trees along the walk, some of which are still standing. Other yews are self set. Numerous other trees have grown up over the years.

Approaching the corner, one can see bee hives in Little Park, near the walk, so if you are allergic to bee stings, take care here

As you walk to the north east corner you can enjoy good views across Little Park to the house and the Kings Tower. But at the corner you come upon one of the most impressive sights of the walk – a London Plane tree. Two were planted in 1660, to mark

the restoration of the monarchy. The second is visible across Little Park, nearer the house.

The tree in the corner here is planted on a raised mound. It would originally have been a viewing mound for the Bishop to admire his palace.

Around the corner, is the first view of the lake. Originally there were 3 small fish ponds and one larger one. These were amalgamated into the present single lake. This is now a valuable wildlife sanctuary, with kingfishers, frogs, newts and dragonflies, as well as ducks and moorhens.

Towards the southern end of the walk beside the lake is a stone statue facing across the lake towards the house. This is a representation of Jesus by the Sea of Gallilee.

At the southern end of the lake is another viewing mound, now covered with trees. It is probable that there would have been a wooden bridge to get from the path to the mound.

Going north again one comes to a nuttery and orchard. These trees were planted by volunteers who restored the grounds in the early 1990s. They are planted in quincunxes – a pattern similar to the 5 on dice. All the trees are varieties which would have been available and planted in England in the 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> centuries.

Walking through them and approaching the house, there is an avenue of pleached limes to the north. This is a type of training of trees that would have been familiar to the Bishops.

Approaching the house one crosses a wide stretch of lawn. In the 19<sup>th</sup> century there were formal gardens here, but it is impossible now to maintain them.

It is an easy (but difficult for wheelchairs unfortunately) walk in the heart of our village and if you have half an hour to spare strolling around it, it will reward you with peace, tranquillity and simple pleasures.

#### **Black Squirrels Again**

Alec MacAndrew, editor of the edition of the Roundabout featuring the article on black squirrels in Buckden, writes: We have received an unusual quantity of unsolicited feedback, almost all of it praising the article and the photos that accompanied it. Almost everyone who commented found the piece enjoyable, light-hearted yet informative about the black squirrel phenomenon, which has received quite a lot of interest in Buckden recently.

We also received feedback from one reader who was keen to stress the negative aspect of grey squirrels. Although this was touched on in the article, this reader stressed the destructive side of grey squirrels. They are an introduced invasive species. They damage crops and property (particularly if they get into roof spaces). They are damaging to some native species of broadleaf woodland and are a major cause for the demise of red squirrels in the south of the country through a combination

of resource competition and the effects of a virus which they carry that is fatal to red squirrels. In law, they are classed as vermin and can be legally dispatched humanely. The Forestry Commission along with other bodies are working in partnership to develop methods of controlling the grey squirrel population by culling and by developing a contraceptive to limit their fertility.

Nevertheless, grey (and black) squirrels have been a fact of life in our gardens, parks and woodland for decades. Many people, while aware of their invasive and destructive side, find them attractive animals and enjoy observing them. We are very grateful to everyone who gave us feedback.
